


# Fulton County Board of Health Epidemiology Report

COVID-19 Cases - 3/2/2021

### **SUMMARY**

- As of March 2, 2021, Fulton County has recorded **74,483 cases of the 2019 novel coronavirus** (COVID-19) and **1,059 confirmed COVID-19 deaths.** 108 deaths are currently being reviewed by GA DPH to confirm cause of death.
- Of **2,437 new diagnoses** made between February 10 and February 23, the central portion of the county (Atlanta) accounted for 44% while the northern and southern parts accounted for 33% and 22% respectively.
- By city, new COVID-19 case rates range from 152.0 per 100,000 persons (Hapeville) to 480.0 per 100,000 persons (Mountain Park). [Fulton County Diagnoses Rates (per 100,000 persons): Cumulative 6776.2; Incidence –221.7]. See map showing incident case rate by ZIP code on Pg.12.
- Among all persons diagnosed with COVID-19 in Fulton County since August 1, 4.0% required hospitalization and 1.1% died.
- Of all testing done in Fulton County between February 15 and February 28, the percent positivity rate was 6.0%.



\*Counts shown reflect the number of confirmed cases as of 9:00 pm on 2/25/21 using the date of first positive sample collection. Where date of sample collection was not available or missing, the date of report creation in GA SENDSS was used instead. **Note:** Delays in data reporting may cause changes in data counts, particularly in

the shaded portion. Data throughout this report are preliminary and subject to ongoing data cleaning processes, and thus are subject to change.

### DISTRIBUTION OF COVID-19 CASES BY REGION

New cases: 44% of the new COVID-19 cases in the past 2 weeks occurred in Atlanta while 33% and 22% occurred in the Northern and Southern regions of the county respectively.



In the recent two week reporting period (2/10-2/23), there were fewer new cases of COVID-19 in Fulton County than the previous two weeks (1/27-2/9).




## TRENDS IN COVID-19 CASES, HOSPITALIZATIONS AND DEATHS (7-DAY MOVING AVE.)















### REPORTING SYMPTOMS AMONG PERSONS WITH COVID-19 IN FULTON


People with COVID-19 have reported a wide range of symptoms ranging from mild symptoms to severe illness. Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus. Fig. 11a & b. Total Proportion Reporting Symptoms in Fulton







These data are generated using a fixed start date and counted forward in 14-day intervals. Using these time blocks allows for the stability in trends over time and accounts for delays in reporting lab results.






## TRENDS IN COVID-19 CASES AMONG DEMOGRAPHIC GROUPS (14 DAY PERIODS)



In the past two weeks, the city of Atlanta has accounted for the majority of new cases.









About 17% of all Fulton County COVID cases are missing data on patient race and ethnicity and in the past two weeks, about 18% of cases are missing this data.






## COVID-19 TESTING AND POSITIVITY IN FULTON COUNTY BY AGE AND RACE







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### COVID-19 IN LONG-TERM CARE FACILITIES IN FULTON COUNTY


